Children: Always a Blessing

While many churches celebrate Life Sundays at the end of January, tens of thousands gather on the National Mall for the annual March for Life. During this time, those of us who see life as a precious gift from God spend time contemplating the value of life from conception to natural death, especially the value of this life to the One who has given us life. But there are just as many, if not more, who don't see life as the blessing from God that it truly is.


These are the ones who I've had say to me, "Say goodbye to date nights!" "Better catch up on that sleep now because you won't be getting any." "You'll never have any free time, so you better use it now." For those who have ever been expecting a child, these statements probably sound familiar. They're the types of remarks my wife and I have received each time we were expecting the birth of a child. And it doesn't end after the kids are born. My wife likes to laugh when someone will approach her in the grocery store and marvel at how she can possibly handle four children all at once. Her response is always a lighthearted, "This is nothing, the other three are at home with their dad."

So often the message I hear is that children are a burden and an inconvenience. It's so sad that one of the most exciting adventures we're privileged to embark on is often clouded with pessimism. I think the main reason children are viewed so negatively is they keep us from being able to do what we want when we want to do it. Before being married and having children I could just pick up and go wherever I wanted at a moment's notice. It didn't matter how late it was or if was naptime, I just went. If I wanted to go out for a few hours just for fun, I could do that. And I didn't have to lug a heavy car seat or diaper bag around. I could just go.

But as I look to God's Word, I can't help but view children in a very different way. They are a blessing. Psalm 127:3-5a says "Behold, children are a gift from the Lord, the fruit of the womb a reward. Like arrows in the hand of a warrior are the children of one's youth. Blessed is the man who fills his quiver with them!" I think the very reason many people consider children a burden is actually the reason they're a blessing!

God is in the business of conforming us into the image of His son, Jesus, (Rom. 8:29) who came to earth to serve and save mankind through sacrificing His very life (Phil. 2:3-11). What better way to become made into the image of Jesus than to become a parent, or otherwise to take on the care of a child? The gift of a little child forces us to give up our right to what we want for their wellbeing. All those long nights my wife spends rocking babies to sleep certainly limits her freedom. The games and the activities that we're constantly shuttling children to remind me that this life is not about me and what I want. All this allows us to daily practice the command to "do nothing from selfishness, but consider others as more important than myself." (Phil. 2:3)

Being the one to care for a child also causes us to depend on the grace of God in a deeper and more constant way. Whether we're struggling to sleep at night or embarrassed by their behavior when we're out in public, we're forced to run to God in prayer for patience, guidance, and peace. More often than we'd like to admit, life is out of our control. This realization reminds us that it's better to be dependent on God than on our own resources. That's why 2 Corinthians 12:9-11 tells us that we are strongest in our weakness because it's God's grace we're depending on.

All of this is great, but the most exciting thing about caring for children is the ability we have to change the world. For better or worse, parents affect the lives of children in the deepest and most profound ways and impact the trajectory of their lives. What I invest in my children today will show forth in their lives when they reach adulthood and have the opportunity to influence the next generation of children. If I raise them to be confident men and women who know the truth of the Word of God and keep their eyes fixed on Jesus as the highest priority in their lives, this world will be a better place. And even more than changing the world, the strong foundation of faith they're given will be their strength in troubled times and the assurance of their salvation.

Raising children can often feel like a burden, and at times it will wear us down. But there is no doubt that children are always a blessing. Through them God tames our self-centeredness, draws us closer to Himself in dependence on His grace, and allows us to impact the world through the faithful men and women we raise. Life is a precious gift, given to us by God Himself. Value life at all stages, and always remember what a blessing it is to be a child of God.


- 1. Read your Bible more
