Giving Thanks for His Servants

The latest issue of For the Life of the World, the quarterly publication of Concordia Theological Seminary in Fort Wayne, IN, is dedicated to the many opportunities that exist to support the seminary, the students preparing for ministry, and the faculty who serve those students and the church. One article highlights the calling of the seminary's instructors to lead and mentor the students, for "how are they to learn without someone teaching?" From faculty who have been at the institution for over 55 years, to those just called to serve, each has a heart for raising up the next generation of shepherds for Christ's church. This is true of the faculty at Concordia Seminary in St. Louis as well. Both institutions have world-renowned theological faculty who teach the Scriptures and the practical aspects of pastoral ministry to our next pastors in ways that prepare them for the Office they are called to.

There were two other highlights of this issue that stood out to me. The first was the emphasis the seminaries have placed on reducing the indebtedness of pastoral candidates graduating from our seminaries. Through the generosity of many, this amount has come down significantly in the last few years, yet still remains a factor in the decision of some to explore this important work. The second was the highlighting of the gratefulness of a few of the seminarians for the support they have received as they pursue God's calling into the pastoral ministry. Three individuals and families were featured, but I know from experience that every single student at our seminaries is a grateful recipient of far more than they could have asked or imagined. And it's all a result of the generosity of God's faithful people, recognizing a need and responding in faith to prepare future servants for the church.

We at Emmanuel have long been a part of that faithful group, responding to the need and blessing the Church's future pastors. In fact, we dedicate our mission offerings in two separate months, along with some of our Christian Education offerings to the support of both our seminaries, and to individual seminarians. And they, like those featured in the seminary's magazines (copies of which can be found on the table in the narthex), are always extremely grateful. We receive heartfelt thanks from both seminaries when they are blessed by our gifts, and are always happy to hear from our seminarians who truly appreciate the gifts of support and prayer that we regularly offer to them. So this month I wanted to highlight for you the two seminarians who we are supporting during the upcoming academic year. You've seen their names, but now get to know a little more about them. And keep them in your prayers as they follow God's calling to bless their future congregations and the church at large by faithfully proclaiming God's Word and His great love for all His people.

History of Bratwurst Day

To celebrate the city's 100th anniversary, Bratwurst Day was born on Thursday, August 13, 1953. The idea, conceived by A. Matt Werner, editor of The Sheboygan Press, was a means of publicizing Sheboygan's claim to fame: the bratwurst. The event was sponsored by the Sheboygan Jaycees with the support of then Mayor Edward C. Schmidt and Governor Walter Kohler.

Schmidt's proclamation, which designated the 13th as Bratwurst Day read, in part: Whereas, this community has achieved national fame and recognition for the exclusive manufacture of a special kind of roasting sausage, and Whereas, it is a known and established fact that the production and distribution of bratwurst has increased year by year to a point where it has become an industry of vital importance to this community—all citizens and visitors are to refrain from roasting bratwurst on their own grills and will attend and enjoy the "Bratwurst Festivities" to be held on the main street in the City of Sheboygan.

Streets were renamed Bratwurst Boulevard (North 8th Street) and Onion Oasis to provide the right atmosphere for the festivities. An estimated 7,000 pounds of brats, 96 gallons of dill pickles, 288 bottles of ketchup, 288 jars of mustard and 350 pounds of onions were consumed.

Activities of the first Bratwurst Days included the crowning of the bratwurst queen, brat eating contest, parade, square dancing, polka music and fireworks. A time capsule was also buried in Fountain Park. Various articles of Sheboygan historical interest were placed in the capsule, to be opened in 2053, 100 years from 1953. Today, Brat Days still provides brat lovers from all over the country with a one-of-a-kind brat experience.
