#### **Distracted Living**


He's coming, he's coming! It's the cry of the fans as the superstar musician prepares to come on stage. He's coming! It's the shout of the masses as Jesus enters Jerusalem on Palm Sunday. He's coming! It's the subject of so many hymns we'll be singing this month. He's coming! It's the cry of every child as the final float appears in the Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade.

This season of Advent seems as though it should be so simple. Slow down a little bit and ponder the birth of the baby Jesus. Reflect on the fact that his life, death and resurrection were only possible because God decided to humble Himself and be born of a virgin. And yet, instead of being the simplest and slowest time of the year, this season brings with it the greatest number of distractions and creates the greatest amount of stress.

We've all heard of distracted driving. Focusing our attention on anything other than the road while we're behind the wheel is clearly a bad thing. But what about distracted living. You've likely seen the videos, or perhaps you've witnessed it in person, where the man or woman falls into the fountain because they were walking with their head down checking the messages on their phone. This is what I think so many people look like during these weeks leading up until Christmas. When our focus should be so squarely placed on the miracle of the incarnation, Christ coming into this world, we instead find ourselves distracted by everything else the world says this season should be. Don't get me wrong, I love this season. The music, the lights, the anticipation and the gift-giving. It all can help to focus us on the reality of that day over 2,000 years ago, when God entered this world as a baby. But when it draws us away from that reality and into a world of our own making, then we need to step back and remember what we are celebrating.

Throughout this month there is so much that can and will distract us from Christmas. So much of it will even be in the name of celebrating Christmas, but ultimately serve to draw our attention away from what we celebrate on December 25<sup>th</sup>. My hope and my prayer for myself, my family and our entire church family is that we would each walk with our heads up, squarely focused on Christ, whose coming into this world we celebrate and whose second coming we anticipate. Let this be for us not a season of distracted living, but one of focused living, taking advantage of the additional opportunities to gather and prepare, to worship and to celebrate the joy we have in Christ. Because He's coming! He's coming!

## **Advent Traditions**

One of the traditions within the season of Advent is the observance of special commemoration days, namely St. Nicholas, Bishop of Myra on December 6<sup>th</sup> and St. Lucia, Martyr on December 13<sup>th</sup>. As numerous stories surrounding St. Nicholas spread and became legend, Martin Luther was concerned that the observance of St. Nicholas day was becoming separated from Christ—the true giver of gifts. As a response and an effort to replace St. Nicholas Day, Luther began the tradition of celebrating the *Christkindt* or Christ Child who would bring gifts to children on Christmas Eve. Though Luther hoped to eliminate the secular traditions surrounding St. Nicholas, Lutherans today still observe his commemoration and give thanks to God for the gifts He gave him to bless others and confess Christ in a time of darkness and per-



secution. St. Lucia was a Christian martyr in the 4<sup>th</sup> century who is traditionally known for wearing a candle-lit crown to light her way through the catacombs as she brought food to Christians who were being persecuted. Her commemoration is meant to signal that Christmas is coming soon when Christ, the light of the world will arrive. Today many Christians throughout the world celebrate by lighting candles and attending major festivals not only to commemorate her confession of faith and care for persecuted Christians, but in anticipation of the coming of the Christ child.

There is so much beauty and rich tradition during the season of Advent to prepare Christians for the coming of Jesus, the babe of Bethlehem. If you don't have one already, consider getting an Advent wreath for your home as you prepare for the coming of Christ, the light of the world. Give thanks to God for the confession of faith He gave to His people to shine His light in dark places. Learn about the tradition of reciting the *O Antiphons* (found in *Lutheran Service Book* along with hymn #357 "O Come, O Come, Emmanuel) and incorporate it into your Advent devotions. Finally, anticipate with joy the coming of our Lord!

What are your Advent traditions? Share them with one another and consider adding something new and meaningful this year.
