

TOGETHER AGAIN!

"For if we have been united with him in a death like his, we shall certainly be united with him in a resurrection like his" (Romans 6:5 ESV).

Ever since this pandemic began, we have longed to be together again. This, in addition to being without a full-time pastor, has been difficult. At first, we were able to view the Divine Service only through YouTube. But being online is not the same as real, bodily presence. It's like looking at a picture or going to a cemetery to remember a loved one—it is not the same as being present with them in the flesh.

Slowly but surely more of us are coming together again as the pandemic begins to fade. It is good to be together again. It is good to be able to come up to the altar rail to receive Holy Communion. It is good to be able to greet our Guest Pastor, Pastor Scheblein, at the end of the service. We have also received the news that we will have a full-time pastor once more among us. His name is *Rev. Paul Marks*.

And what a blessing it is to know that Jesus Himself comes among us every Lord's Day in the flesh by His Spirit at work through His Word. He comes to give us His body to eat and His blood to drink and joins us together with angels, archangels, and all the company of heaven. We have communion with God and each other, and with those who have gone before us. The writer to the Hebrews reminds us of this when he says, "we are surrounded by a great cloud of witnesses" (Hebrews 12:1). And yet, we are guaranteed because of Easter and can look forward to it being even better than that.

We have been reminded by Pastor Scheblein and will be by our new Pastor Marks, that Jesus rose from the dead in His body. Jesus Himself highlighted that fact when He said to Thomas, "Reach your finger here, and look at My hands; and reach your hand here and put it into my side. Do not be unbelieving but believing" (John 20:27). Since we are baptized into the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ, we, too, will experience the resurrection of our bodies at the end of all time. Our bodies will be resurrected and recreated to perfection, and they will never die. The prophet Isaiah reminds us of that when he says, "Your dead will live; their bodies will rise" (Isaiah 26:19). And John writes, "[Jesus] will wipe every tear from their eyes. There will be no more death or mourning or crying or pain, for the old order of things has passed away" (Revelation 24:1). The apostle Paul puts it this way, "Our citizenship is in heaven, and from it we await a Savior, the Lord Jesus Christ, who will transform our lowly body to be like his glorious body, by the power that enables him even to subject all things to himself" (Philippians 3:20-21).

In Christ, someday we will be together again bodily, in the flesh, with all those who have gone before us. We will be given an eternity to enjoy life as it was created and redeemed to be. As the apostle Paul reminds us, "if the Spirit of Him who raised Jesus from the dead dwells in you, He who raised Christ Jesus from the dead will also give life to your mortal bodies through His Spirit who dwells in you" (Romans 8:11). Jesus said, "Let not your hearts be troubled. Believe in God; believe also in me. In my Father's house are many rooms. If it were not so, would I have told you that I go to prepare a place for you? And if I go and prepare a place for you, I will come again and will take you to myself, that where I am you may be also" (John 14:1-2). We are brought together once more in celebration of a new Pastor and we have the joy of Easter. We are together again, together forever in the glory of God!

Liturgy Parts — LCMS Worship

Meaning of Liturgy Part: Nunc Dimittis

Another Lutheran contribution to the church's liturgy is the use of the Nunc Dimittis as the post-communion canticle: "Lord, now let Your servant depart in peace."

At first glance it appears that we're taking the words of Simeon completely out of context. After all, what does his experience have to do with ours?

How can Holy Communion ever compare to Simeon's unique honor of holding the infant Jesus in his arms during the child's first visit to the temple at the tender age of 40 days (Luke 2:25-38)?

Of course, we would love to have been in the temple and shared in the experience with Simeon. For that matter, we would give anything to have been the first—along with the shepherds—to see the infant Jesus, or to have been with the Magi as they offered their gifts to him.

But, as Luther so insightfully taught, we don't find Christ in those places. Through the events of his incarnation, birth, crucifixion, and resurrection our Lord has accomplished our salvation.

But the benefits of his saving work—forgiveness, life, and salvation—are distributed to us through his means of grace, his Word and Sacraments. We can't go back to stand with Simeon in the temple. The good news is that we don't have to.

So when, following our reception of the Lord's Supper, we sing Simeon's ancient song of faith—"Lord, now let your servant depart in peace"—nothing could be more appropriate. Indeed, our eyes have seen his salvation. Better yet, we have tasted and seen that the Lord is good (Psalm 34:8).


