# Lutheranism 101

LUTHERANS BELIEVE...

You could give that leading thought to members of Lutheran congregations all over the world and you'd get an abundance of differing answers. Not just a listing of all the things we do believe as Lutherans, but you'd likely also get some contradictory assertions about what we believe. You'd probably hear that we believe in the Trinity, Law and Gospel, Justification by Faith, Christ's Saving Work on the Cross, Two Sacraments, and Christ Coming Again on Judgement Day. All these things would be true, but there are also a lot of things you might hear that are in fact not a part of our beliefs as Lutherans. I've recently heard that there are some who think Lutherans believe that once you're baptized you will certainly go to heaven. Or that Luther's intention was to break away from the Roman Catholic church. Sorting out the truth from the fiction is one thing we have a responsibility to do.


As we approach Reformation Day at the end of the month, we often take a closer look at who we are as Lutherans and how we differ from other denominations. And the best way to do this is to follow the direction of Jesus given to us in the words John records for us in the 8<sup>th</sup> chapter of his Gospel account. "If you abide in my word, you are truly my disciples, and you will know the truth, and the truth will set you free...So if the Son sets you free, you will be free indeed." (John 8:31b-32, 36) This was the heart of the Reformation. Getting back to the Holy Scriptures as our guide for what is truth and recognizing that the Son is the One who sets us free from sin.

Over the next few months, we will be exploring what it means to be Lutheran in our Sunday morning Bible Class. By using the resource Lutheranism 101, which leads us into the Scriptures and the Lutheran Confessions, we'll sort out the truth from fiction and be led deeper into the teaching, doctrine, and practice of the Lutheran church. Our study will guide us through topics such as:

## From Rev. Dr. Jonathan Mumme

Dear Brothers and Sisters and friends of Emmanuel Lutheran Church Adell.

You paid me the generous kindness of a doctoral cap and a doctoral hood as a parting gift. Normally caps are worn and hoods are given when the doctorate is conferred, but the Germans did away with all such ceremony—probably under the Marshall Plan—after WWII, and my whole process was a bit anti-climatic. My doctorate became official, rather quietly, in 2015, when my dissertation was published. So I never got my hat, hood, or robes, but instead fulfilled the role of usher during commencement exercises at CUW. With the transition to Hillsdale College, however, the academic regalia was needed. The cap. hood, and robes were crafted by Mr. Kenneth Crawford of Oxford, England (Google "Robes of Distinction" to see his work). We were both sweating bullets, as they got hung up in customs, but then did arrive

just 24 hours before opening ceremonies at Hillsdale College. I felt so proud to be clothed in them and to have a place in the ranks of this faculty; they are a group of truly impressive people.

During my orientation week and during all the formal exercises of the year's opening, I was impressed how every event included (Trinitarian! i.e., Christian-specific) prayer and the Pledge of Allegiance. I wonder where else you might still find a college faculty that rises and puts their hands over their hearts to pledge allegiance to our republic, which stands under the God whom we understand to have revealed himself fully in Christ. I feel utterly humbled and very excited to be a part of this work, especially at this juncture in history. We are seeking to educate in such a way that students are led into the fullness of

> their God-given potential, and Christian theology is at the heart of this liberating art as we pursue it at Hillsdale. Please pray for me, as I will be stretched to live up to this new vocation.

Our family is doing well, though we miss you all and much else in Wisconsin. The sadness of the children has run in reverse order of age. Silas' evening prayer requests now often include the wish that we would move back to our old house . . . . Nonetheless, we are making new friends, settling into a new home, and being welcomed into a new congregation, where the Lord is providing for us on all levels. Please know that we miss you very much, and please accept my gratitude for the academic regalia. I will try to wear it well.
