The meaning of Liturgy Part: Confession and Absolution (part 1 of 2)

We can indeed approach God with confidence. And yet, because we stand on this side of our Lord's final return, we still have with us the devil, the world, and our sinful flesh. We have not yet faced the final judgment.

And so, with sin still working in us, the condemnation of God's Law must still confront us, lest we have any delusions that we might have something to boast of before our mighty Judge.

Above all else, Confession and Absolution keep us honest — honest with ourselves and honest before God. The act of confession is not some work that we lay before the Father's throne; rather, it is the simple acknowledgment that God's Word is true and right and that when we measure ourselves against its demands, we come up short.

God's Word says "you shall not give false testimony," but in truth we have lied and gossiped and slandered. And so, the Christian confesses: "Lord, Your Word is true; I have sinned."

There are three basic ways to handle sin and guilt. One is to ignore or minimize them. We've all been tempted in that direction more than a few times. Isn't that, after all, what our sinful human nature is all about?

Another way is to institutionalize them, especially the guilt part. After all, if you can keep people feeling just guilty enough, you will keep them coming back for more.



- ◆ We received a note from **POBLO**, our November Mission of the Month, thanking us for our donation of \$1,150, and our prayers, partnership and support.
- ◆ Vacancy News. Emmanuel's request for Pastoral Candidates was received by the South Wisconsin District on Thursday, January 9. It will take two to four weeks to receive the names of the candidates from the District. The Call Committee will meet and review the candidates and bring forward a slate of candidates that they feel are the best fit for us. You can expect a Congregational Call Meeting some time in February. Notice will be given in the bulletin. Also, check our Facebook page for upcoming events and meetings.
- ◆ Inclement Weather Information. For weather-related closings, turn to television station WTMJ 4 or Fox 6 Storm Center for information about cancellations at Emmanuel. If you have internet access, you can find the closings on both of these channels' websites, or download their app for notifications.
- ◆ Electrical Work Completed. Konz Electric has been busy the past few weeks making improvements in Memorial Hall

and the secretary's office. Last year the Sub-Zero refrigerator in the hall died and needed replacement. Through Nancy Eberhardt's diligent efforts we purchased a poor man's version of the Sub Zero, a Frigidaire Professional refrigerator that is standard width. With the additional room Glen Wilterdink moved the cabinets, stove and ranges to create enough space to accommodate the older commercial refrigerator next to those appliances. A new electrical plug was installed behind the commercial refrigerator (the switch to turn on the unit is located in the cabinet above the ranges). New outlets were installed on the north wall under the windows for additional service for our Souper Dinner and Father's Day Chicken and Waffle Breakfast. New outlets were also installed on the north wall adjoining the countertop. The octopus of power strips in the secretary's office was replaced with outlets for all computer and internet equipment, with an exterior outlet outside of the Pastor's office. New heat tape was installed on the Food Pantry roof drains along with a new exit light with an electric eye to turn on the exterior LED west-side entry light, improving the lighting in our parking lot. Thanks to all our members for making these improvements possible.

Learning from our History

It was resolved on January 12, 1941, that Voters meetings be conducted in the English language and minutes recorded like-

It was resolved on May 19, 1941, to call a "permanent" teacher; Resolved to celebrate the 25th anniversary with two services, a dinner, and extend an invitation to three congregations: Sherman Center, Batavia, and Cascade; Resolved to invite Rev. Walter Schroth to be guest preacher It was resolved on October 4, 1942, to combine confessional service with regular service when communion is celebrated. On August 8, 1943, Rev. Schroth presented a letter of resignation, due to his wife's illness, his farewell sermon to be preached August 29, 1943. It was Resolved to accept his Resignation. Teacher Rush informed voters he had received call to serve as teacher at Immanuel Lutheran School, Cleveland, Ohio.

On August 12, 1943, the call to Mr. Rush was discussed and a vote was taken asking him to remain at Emmanuel.
